I wandered around the sidewalks of Brevard with my headphones on, listening to the inauguration. Our new president had just been sworn in, but this change seemed so fragile. I was still reeling from what happened to

our nation's capital building and I was nervous, worried and anxious. I have never seen this county so divided, our communities so stressed. I was so happy to see this change in leadership, but I wondered how could things change with so much anger, mistrust and spiritual darkness present in our country?

Then this amazing, brave young woman got up and apparently understood how to speak directly to my soul. As I listened to her beautiful, bold words, I walked past the new playground being installed at Silversteen Park, and I felt so much HOPE. Ms. Gorman gently reminded me that hope is not blind optimism but a muscle that we flex. Hope is a belief in a bright future AND an enthusiastic effort to achieve that bright future. Ms. Gorman reminded me that if it's dark, then I can look to my community for light. And if I still can't find that light, then, by golly, I'll just start glowing myself and guide the way for others.

UUTC has been the light that many of us look to for support and understanding during these strange times. More than ever, I have needed a community to help carry the heavy load of grief and disappointment and to magnify the precious joys. I realize I've been lucky. This pandemic has been especially devastating for those of us...with more experience at living...who may not understand Zoom, FaceTime, Facebook chatting—the whole mess of ways that children, grandchildren, family and friends have been trying to keep in touch. But through this pandemic, UUTC has been a community of role models for my young children. It's been the moral compass we needed, and it's shown our children how to start looking for their own inner light.

Even as the struggle continues under the weight of COVID-19 and its financial impacts, our community has to carry on with its projects and programs. According to Joanna Bliss, chair of the UUTC Community Outreach Endowment Fund (COEF) Committee, "There are so many programs within our county that provide services and functions to keep life here healthy, stimulating, and safe for both adults and children."

Bliss added, "Those programs are more important than ever, and they need widespread support to continue their missions. UUTC's COEF Committee is now in a position to make awards to a few of our county's non-profits and programs. While the fund has financial limits, every donation helps. The Committee felt that each of these organizations contributes to the needs of our community."

"As the COEF Committee reviewed our list of potential award recipients, we felt that STEP (Serving Together Empowers People) complemented the work already being done by Sharing House's Power Up Program. STEP provides firewood and its delivery to homes throughout the area, and it also aids those unable to do their own much-needed home repairs."

Rivers Smith, CEO, and Carolyn Smith from STEP WNC commented, "We're excited. This financial award means a lot to our non-profit and to the people we serve. It increases our ability to help and draws attention to our work and our goals. People who are interested in what we do can check our website at STEPWNC.org. There are opportunities for volunteering and donating, as well as recommending individuals that might benefit from one or more of our services."

As a part of the first disbursement of COEF moneys from this UUTC fund, the COEF Committee also named as recipients the Silversteen Playground Project and the Cindy Platt Boy & Girls Club. Like STEP, the former received \$3000 for their ongoing construction.

City Council member Maurice Jones said, "We appreciate UUTC's award. It's another example of the heartwarming participation within our community. Volunteers and donors all prove once again that it still takes a village. It's a great example of caring, especially during the pandemic when so much is needed." City Council Member Maureen Copelof added, "The City is very grateful for this donation. The playground is open, but incomplete, so fund raising is continuing, and we welcome the support."

The Cindy Platt Boys & Girls Club received \$1000 for their Club library to increase its supply of fiction and nonfiction materials related to diversity education, both in print and other media. Caitlyn Murray, Educational

Director at the Boys & Girls Club, has changes in mind for the summer reading program at the Club. She stated, "In the past we've had a series of books that we use for each grade level and we have repeated their use each summer. As part of our planning since last summer, we agreed to concentrate on diversity in our media selections, including book and film choices. We'll be creating a full program based on works by authors of color. This award will provide wonderful support for that plan."

The final beneficiary for this fiscal year will be the Davidson River School's \$2700 Farm to Table Project, which will include gardening and cooking programs. Students will also be aided by UUTC volunteers led by the Social Action Team throughout this educational effort. Davidson River School's principal Barbara Grimm added, "We, too, are grateful. It allows us to have another meaningful

program that works toward our goal of helping our students develop both knowledge and practical experiences related to sustainable living."
