


# Like An Ever-Flowing Stream

The project was simple: UUTC invited members and the public to create chalices from clay, at home, Member and Congregational Administrator RK Young had the idea while sitting on her back porch. roung has the idea while sitting on her back porch, "distensed for our members, who are my friends, and trying to figure out something that we could safely do as an activity that would feel communal," she explained.

she explained. Young, a settired art teacher, created an instruc-tional video and ouline signup sheet, and managed all things clay. Administrative Assistant Eloise Shepard scheduled clay pickup times so partici pants could claim the material, pickurapped, from pens container outside the church where complete, chalices were taken to the vestry ahead of firing. Masks, gloves, baggies, and Lysol played a part "It was sort of a no-contact kind of deal," said Shepaad. But the connection was tangible. One congre-

gant's adult children suddenly opted out, so she and her friend worked the clay in a covered porch as a rainstorm toiled. Kelli "Rabbit" Krueger and her s-year-old, Kitra, also participated. "My daughter really needs things more hands-on," Krueger said. "This new Zoom video world wasn't really working for her." Each design was unique, Young suid: "So many... just spoke of joy and peace." about the project and signed up, emails ensued. "And then people got to go to the church, even if its just to pick up clay... Visually, you're connected with the physical space of the church," Shepard said. On June as, members gathered at UUTC for the first time since March for an outdoor celebration that was also livestreamed. As their youth lit each chalice, the constellation of flames became one. Then, accompanied by a mandolin and a guitar. the people sang "This Little Light of Mine.
