Teams, aligned with Ministry and operating with guidance from the Minister, are the groups which plan and execute the activities of the congregation. They spend money. Committees, which provide policy and planning guidance to the Board, do not spend money. So if you are on a committee and didn't get invited, don't feel bad!

Giving Tuesday and the Future of Programming



As of this writing (early afternoon on Friday), gifts given through our web-based Giving Tuesday platform have reached \$4,025. Another \$3,100 has been promised in old-fashioned delivery (check!). Support for adding some fresh air to the mix at UUTC is pretty strong. Matching funds have been delivered — \$5,000. Your generosity has been terrific... we are almost to our goal! What happens then? One HVAC company declined to bid, so we are still seeking the third bid... the second bid has been on site but paperwork is not yet in my hands. The Board hopes to be able to consider these bids by the end of December.

In the meantime, Nancy Thompson has agreed to help with Virtual Coffee Hour — we need a couple more people willing to learn how to "usher" a Zoom meeting to assist her. Please <u>email me</u>!

Kevin Lausch and Facilities Leader Bob Bennett have been plotting the installation of an appropriately large, but not too expensive fire pit. We hope to have that ready by the December 12th Caroling event. It will then be ready for adult and children's programming. Are you



a parent of children who can be responsible for FIRE? Are you an adult without children who would be happy to host a fire at UUTC? Can you donate some firewood? If you look at the second chart above, you will see that Flame & Friendship outstripped all other proposed activities. It will be most effective if we have several smaller groups rather than just a couple large ones. Please <u>email me</u> if you are willing to host! After all, groups need to be small enough that we can all get our hands warm while safely distanced. As always, masks will be required.

Last night, Kevin and I attended (Rev. Bob had a conflict) a regional meeting of congregations willing to share online programming with others. The hope is that we can pool resources — if each congregation can contribute at least one class/group/discussion that can be shared, we are all richer for the possibilities offered. SECUURES (South East Cooperative UUs Religious Education Shenanigans) — Ok, that last S might not really be a thing — will be archived by a volunteer from the Franklin, NC congregation using Moogle, and all congregations in the region who wish to participate will be given access to the site. This includes virtual book study groups, discussion groups — you name it. If you are willing to take an activity online and share it — let us know!

We're also looking for people who might lead a small group "personal or family" spirituality program. Due to our enforced isolation, we are being offered an opportunity to develop personal rituals that will serve us during the next few months. If you would be willing to lead an exploration on this topic, please be in touch.
