THE SOCIAL HALL WILL BE OPEN TO SMALL GROUPS BY THE END OF APRIL

My thanks to those who shared your thoughts about what you're comfortable doing as we consider plans to safely restart various church activities. The Task Force met this week and we have decided to open the Social Hall to small groups (8-10) who are keen to gather in person once again. Mandatory social distancing and masks will help make this a safe step. We offer this space both to community groups who regularly met at UUTC such as the Living Wage Coalition and the Rainbow Alliance, and

small UUTC groups or teams who would like to meet inside. Leaders of groups who want to use this space should contact RK to schedule a brief training, and contact Eloise to book a time. We ask group leaders to take responsibility for wiping down the arms of chairs, bathroom door handles and other surfaces, and ensure that all members are masked. Wipes and hand sanitizer will be provided, and disposable masks will be available for anyone who does not bring a mask. No sumptuous meals or tasty treats yet as we don't people taking their masks off so – don't bring food or drinks inside! And although we're also missing our musical opportunities, no singing or instruments for the time being.

Anyone with a fever or who is coughing should not enter the building as a courtesy to others. Our goal here is not just to reopen, but to reopen safely. Wiping down surfaces and allowing an hour between groups will also ensure that the new air exchange system will have time to replenish the room with fresh air. The proximity of our UU's star staff members will be tempting, but remember, they work in enclosed spaces and would prefer that you don't enter their offices. If they have time, they might be willing to join you outside, but please don't visit them in their offices.

Many of you asked about returning to in person worship, but sadly the answer if "Not yet." For the time being, the sanctuary will remain closed except for special events such as memorial services and weddings which must be planned months in advance and are weather sensitive. Now is the time to remain careful as we monitor our air exchange system and keep our ears open to what's going on in our community. Meals on Wheels helps clients maintain their independence in their own homes by providing noontime home delivery of nutritious meals, the only provider of this service in the area. Sometimes this is the only social contact a client has all day.





to children, teens, and adults with developmental, cognitive, emotional, and physical challenges.

The Augustine Literacy Project provides professionally trained tutors for those who cannot afford to pay. Improving reading skills develops children's curiosity and equips them to live in our modern world. Being literate can mean the difference between prison and productivity for an at-risk student.

Bread of Life provides hot lunches every weekday both at their center in Brevard and via home delivery for those unable to come in.

The Children's Center provides emergency and educational assistance to families of young children plus new mother support and children's advocacy.

El Centro helps immigrant families with language tutoring, after-school assistance, and documentation guidance. They run the "Homework Club", an after-school tutoring program for children in grades 1-5. They need help funding summer enrichment activities such as camp and field trips, and funding the training of additional volunteer tutors.

The Haven provides shelter, counseling, and help with rehousing for the homeless of Transylvania County. This includes safe and secure shelter, shower and laundry facilities, 2 light meals a day, case management, and a mail and telephone message service.

Pisgah Legal Services provides free civil legal aid to the most vulnerable people in WNC – disadvantaged children, senior citizens, families at risk of homelessness, and victims of violence. There is an office in Brevard.

SAFE helps victims of domestic violence or sexual assault through prevention and education.

Sharing House provides emergency assistance to the poor including food, clothing, household goods, and assistance in paying utility and rent bills.

Living the 7th Principle—What to Plant

A few years back, the Property Committee recommended (and the Board adopted) a new policy concerning our Property. "When considering the stewardship of the UUTC property, those delegated the authority and responsibility by the Board to make decisions about the management and maintenance of buildings and grounds shall, whenever possible, minimize negative impacts on the environment through the use of natural and native materials, plants and products."

Your Facilities Team has been working under that policy for about three years, during which time a lot of planting has been done. Our newest **blog post**, just in time for spring, includes a link to a spreadsheet of identified plants (both existing and recently planted) and the resources they provide to other living creatures in our area. Gifts of Beauty

Why do we invest resources on making things beautiful? How much money do we spend decorating our homes, or planting our gardens, or choosing our wardrobes? Is this just frivolity? Or does it really matter?

As one who has served frozen dinners of great merit in their original packaging and also transferred into a more aesthetic container, it's very clear that beauty DOES matter. That stuff looks much more appetizing in local pottery than it does in the plastic dish. We know this is true. Why else would world class chefs bother with "presentation?"

Two things happened this week that spurred this article. The first was the draft article by Eloise on the UUTC Library, which 6 years ago was a pitiful collection hiding in what is now Kevin's office, in two broken-down particle board bookcases. No one ever went in there. And then some members of UUTC funded the cabinetry in our foyer. The books became objects of interest, housed in their new vessel. They became valued.

The second was, on our Moai walk this week at Brevard Music Center, Victoria Kerr mentioned a trip to Mexico when she and her companions stumbled across the monarch migration — which I have heard from others is stunning in



its beauty. So stunning that lives change and people come home and plant milkweed. Which we all know is not what one would call a beautiful plant. But what it makes possible! Oh, my!

Every week, members of our Flower Team at UUTC spend the effort to find or create a bit of beauty to welcome us into the Sunday Service. This is a beautiful act of service, and these arrangements are sometimes joyful, or playful, or elegant, or flamboyant. But always a delight. Sometimes the vessel itself is a thing of beauty. Would we still tune in without the flowers? Mostly we would. So why bother?

Flowers on the altar table say that we give a damn. They say welcome. They say, we cared to make this moment beautiful for you. And this is the same reason our musicians work so hard for you to have music, and they continue to improve their craft. They love you and they want you to enjoy the worship service. They want you to be proud to be a member of UUTC. They want people who tune in to our service to get a good "first impression." These are our gifts. Just as you gift those who come to share a meal at your table. Just as your pledges are gifts to not just hold this community together, but to empower the sharing of beautiful thoughts, words and deeds.



Beauty is not frivolous. It is inspirational, powerful, and soulsatisfying. Ponder: if we stripped away that which was not absolutely essential — would you feel welcome? Would you feel respected? Would you feel your worth and dignity in this space, virtual though it is?
