The Strange Marriage of Birth Control and Politics in America



Although women even from ancient cultures were interested in regulating their fertility, the public discussion of birth control began with the public lives of women in the 1840s. There are a lot of odd twists to the story. Victoria Woodhull, the first woman to run for President in 1872, believed in birth control and free love. Some of the early twentieth century feminists

advocated birth control for purposes of guaranteeing race purity. Throughout most of American history, doctors were against birth control, because of its potential impact on the virtue of young women. This lecture will take the long view, the social historian's view, with the hope of stimulating discussion about why a topic so central to adult women's lives remains so controversial.

Margaret Lynn Brown is an Associate Professor of American history at Brevard College, where she teaches a course in U.S. Women's history. The program will begin at 6:30pm.

A Change in Execution

Starting this month, all Charitable Giving contributions will go into a separate fund prior to dispersal. **Therefore, checks should be written TO UUTC**, with the agency designation on the memo line.

This will allow your checks to clear almost immediately, making balancing your checkbook less of an issue. It also guarantees that you can deduct your contribution to the designated cause. UUTC will then write one check to the agency, or in this case, fund, and we will not have dozens of checks sitting around waiting for an agency to collect.

In the past year, our minister has given funds to help purchase medications, pay for



overnight housing, assist with utility bills and a few other needs. Sometimes these gifts support those at UUTC, and sometimes they support others in the community. 

MY FIRST GA BUT NOT MY LAST

The powerful experience of attending my first UUA General Assembly (GA) left me speechless. I have struggled to even begin to put all that happened into words. A very wise woman suggested I write about what I feel, so here goes.......

My first thoughts of attending this GA grew from a personal need to be part of something bigger this year in this faith and in this country, the exciting culture and challenges of New Orleans, and three female candidates running for President of UUA. Then came the resignation of President Peter Morales and the revelation of UUA hiring practices submerged in the water of white supremacy. How would we rise and return to our principles and real Love in real life?

I feel great gratitude toward my UUTC growing edge mentors—to RK Young, for challenging me and making it possible for me post each day on our Facebook page, to Virginia MacDonald, for her company and sharing her extensive GA experience and connections, and to Elizabeth Thompson, who first helped me realize our part in not only a faith but a movement called UU.

I feel inspired. Whether or not you have read some of the Facebook posts, I urge you to read some or all of the 2017 GA UUWorld dispatches at www.uuworld.org/ga for excellent, deeper reporting and wonderful photos. If nothing else, read about the Ware Lecture by Bryan Stevenson, founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery AL, acclaimed author and public interest lawyer, who has dedicated his career to helping the poor, the incarcerated and the condemned by being broken, changing lives, getting proximate, changing the narrative, staying hopeful and being willing to do uncomfortable things. How I wish you could have heard him! Equally inspiring was Linda Sarsour, recipient of UUService Committee's Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Leadership Award. She is described as every Islamophobe's worst nightmare, a Palestinianian-Muslim-American activist, born and raised in Brooklyn, New York. Among other things, she was one of the national co-chairs of the Women's March on Washington.

I feel hopeful. The three Interim Co-Presidents were greeted with deserved adoration and standing ovations every time they appeared. These three people of color temporarily froze hiring, set new hiring goals and directed the Board to appoint an impressive Commission on Institutional Change.

Other faith communities are watching us come up for air and out of the water.

I feel enlightened. I am beginning to understand Black Lives Matter. White lives have always been what has mattered in this country. Black Lives of UU received the UUA President's Award for Volunteer Service and the UUA Board renewed our financial commitment for BLUU. Racial justice work had begun in the 60's, but we broke our promises and turned away. The Black UU Caucus left the 1969 GA. Dr. Baba Sanyika finally



returned to this GA, danced at a jazz filled banner parade and shared his story. The word most heard at this GA was "intersectionality." All justice work must intersect with race and class.

I feel invested. I had prepared to vote for and did for one of three female candidates for UUA President. My second choice vote went to the woman elected, Susan Frederick-Gray. Her performance at the final candidate's forum nearly won first choice from me. She will lead us well. After all sorts of procedures, I voted for a Statement of Conscience on Escalating Inequality, to table changing the word *person* to *being* in the First Principle; to change the words *men and women* to *people* in the Second Source; to call upon the leaders of UUA's Standing on the Side of Love campaign to create a new imagining that better includes and reflects the needs and contributions of disabled people; and to call for the Board to appoint a study commission to discuss adding an 8th Principle in which congregations covenant to affirm and promote a journey toward a diverse, multicultural Beloved Community by actions that dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and





I feel I made a difference. My service project was to be involved in assembling Days for Girls colorful, sustainable feminine hygiene kits for girls in the US and other countries, who would otherwise be made to stay home from school or work. Four teams put together 400 kits in three hours.

I feel the spirit and community of GA worship services still with me. We and thousands of others showed up to see Rev. Ilene walk to receive Preliminary Fellowship; to hear sermons from the heart; to sing "Comfort Me" together, after learning of the assault and robbery of two UUA staff. Walk with me.















