It's hard to believe that nearly three years have passed since my retirement from active ministry. When I look back on those years I spent serving as your minister I consider them to be the culmination and reward of a lifelong struggle to find spiritual freedom.

Words can't describe how much I appreciate the love and support I felt all those years. You were, literally, "the wind beneath my wings." We had our struggles, conflicts

and disappointments along the way, our light journeys and our dark passages. But such is life. We learned together, we laughed and we cried. I was new to Unitarian Universalism and so were/are most of you. Through it all we did more than maintain, we thrived. I described to Ilene my experience of the community of UUTCers as being supportive and challenging (in a good way). My recent participation in the last Wonderful Wednesday musical program was a sheer delight and I look forward to participating in other events and programs.

Meanwhile, "back at the fort," Diane and I are experiencing what it means to be grandparents. Our grandson, Ryan, just turned three and provides us with plenty of physical exercise. Diane is still working full time and I'm speaking occasionally at nearby UU congregations- giving them the "Campbell/Jung" treatment.

I hear great things about UUTC and I expect greater things are in store as you journey forward with Ilene as your guide. It is gratifying to know that in these darkest of times there is still a light that shines and will continue to shine. It is the light of justice and compassion. And in every Chalice Lighting, in every UU congregation throughout the globe, that light is recognized and celebrated.

NOT A CASUAL COMMITMENT — THE HANDS, FEET & HEARTS OF UUTC

Ponder, for a moment, these events and accomplishments:

- Marches in Washington, Asheville, Raleigh, Brevard
- Clean Out of three Varsity properties; Rehabilitation of two
- A two-year, successful, Search process
- Establishment of the Varsity Oxford House for women
- Renewed commitment to our children, their facility needs and their programming
- Renewed commitment to our Mission, especially through the work of Teams

None of this happens if no one shows up to do the work.

Dozens of UUTC Members and Friends participated in marches in our region, state and in DC. Both poster-making and letter writing happened here on campus, as we made space for all to make their voices heard.

More dozens worked to make our new property acquisition a positive help to our community. Their work ensured that two of the properties could be used to fiscally support the purchase we made and to guarantee the ability to stay in place on Varsity Street as long as we choose. Even with paid contractors picking up the load of the necessary licensed work, our short timeline (and the extensive work) could not have been completed without the blisters, bruises and sore backs of so many volunteers. Then, even more volunteers (of time and dollars) stepped in to turn #74 into a missional project—an Oxford House.

In a highly competitive climate, our Search Team put in two heavy-duty years of labor and love to find us a settled minister who would be a match for us and for Brevard. After the Candidating week, 110 of you showed up to vote your faith in that choice—Rev. Ilene Tompkins-Gillispie.

This year we started to really meet the needs of children and their families with a terrific CRE Team and the facility changes necessary to support THIS MANY CHILDREN. Footstools were installed in every bathroom so that small hands can reach each sink; a wall-mounted infant changing station was added to the nursery. We modified the nursery, making it brighter, cleaner and safer. More parents than ever are involved in supporting CRE programming with their own time and talents. Parents dedicated NINETEEN CHILDREN this year. Dozens of children participated in Pre-School Chalice Camp and the Hogwarts School of Magic and Fun. As part of their social justice activities on Sundays, Dumbledore's Army raised \$646.00 for the Naples UU to support migrant workers harmed by hurricane Irma.

In missional work, Facilities teammates and others worked to remove invasive vegetation from our newly-larger lot; the Adult Religious Exploration team revealed a new and improved Library to support our spiritual journeys, while other ARE outreach like Wonderful Wednesdays and Christians in Exile provided growth opportunities for others in addition to ourselves. Our minister, along with a Social Justice Task Force, established for UUTC our own social justice initiative — The Dignity Project. Our Worship Team, also in support of spiritual journeys, established a "Shared Pulpit" class where classmates have been exploring. The Membership Team has continued to provide a path for those who have searched for a liberal religious community. Loving Hearts, Helping Hands has supported so many of us in trying times, easing the journey as they can.

Finally, it's worth noting the weekly efforts of all those who help us practice generosity with one another through their excellent hospitality—those who bring flowers, serve coffee, setup tables, lead classes, provide music—after all, if we cannot be generous with one another, how can we ever hope to lead others in generous thought and action? This Sunday, let them know you appreciate their gifts.

A year of committed effort, from so, so many. Thank you for your covenantal gifts to each other.
