

WORSHIP TEAM IN 2017

The Worship Team assists the Minister in providing spiritually nourishing worship services that are consistent with the values of our congregation. We do this by assisting with services led by our minister, by recruiting and engaging both in-house and outside speakers for Sundays when the minister is not in the pulpit, by providing and training Service Coordinators for those services, and by recruiting and training ushers for all services. For the past few years, we have been responsible for filling large blocks of Sundays while we were between ministers.

In 2017, we expanded our service to the congregation by offering the Shared Pulpit class, designed to discover what we each have to share from the pulpit. We will be hearing from some class members over the summer, and we hope to continue this offering. We also took on responsibility for the Winter Solstice Celebration, begun last year as the effort of a few individuals.

AND THE WINNERS ARE . . .

The Board's "Name that House, Spread our Heritage" contest has concluded. Members and friends elected to name the yellow house **Chalice House** and the gray house **The Olympia Brown House**.

Nine house names were proposed to the Board, and four of those went out to the congregation for vote. There were 33 votes submitted. Chalice House received 24 of 33 votes for the yellow house. The race between Beacon House and Olympia Brown House was neck and neck, first one name in the lead, then the other. In the final tally, Olympia Brown house received 17 votes. Because one person failed to record a vote for the gray house, that left Beacon House with 15 votes, a very close second.

Member Linda Young submitted the name Chalice House. To her, it means a house of love, hope and dreams, which make up the spirit of our church. From her research, she gleaned the symbol of the chalice includes the light of reason, the warmth of community, and the flame of hope. Thank you, Linda!

Member Susan Slocum submitted the name Olympia Brown House. Brown, a Universalist, lived from 1835-1926. She was the first American woman to graduate from a theological school, and

the first female full-time ordained minister of any denomination. When her thin voice was ridiculed by divinity school classmates, she built her lung capacity and became a powerful public speaker. Brown

worked for women's suffrage and was one of the few first-generation suffragists alive to vote after the passage of the 19^{th} Amendment.

Susan felt strongly that her nomination should be a female who pioneered "firsts" because we are conducting our first ministry for women in the gray house, and because this naming took place during the ministry of our first female settled minister. Further, Susan notes that honoring a woman matters because women today are again fighting for their lives and their basic rights, in this country and around the world.

THE DIGNITY PROJECT — SORTING NEXT WEEK

Curious to learn what the Social Justice Task Force has been up to? Plan to join us on **January 3**rd at the UUTC monthly Team Night. In keeping with the Hogwarts' tradition of "sorting," you are invited to help sort products to stock Dignity Pantries for six organizations: El Centro, Sharing House, The Haven,



Bread of Life, The Family Place, and SAFE. You'll recall we have taken on the task of stocking and delivering items which are NOT eligible for purchase through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) – most notably, menstrual hygiene products, diapers, and condoms—items which our neighbors desperately need in order to fully feel their inherent worth and dignity. January will be our first delivery, and what better way to show our commitment to the first principle of "the inherent worth and dignity of every person" than to help others? WHAT DOES INTENTIONAL SOCIAL JUSTICE WORK LOOK LIKE?

In early 2018, a new Social Justice Team will be forming. Rev. Ilene has already tapped Susan Zelle to lead this Team (thank you, Susan!), and she will be joined by Virginia Watkins and Lisa McHenry from the Social Justice Task Force. Rev. Ilene and these individuals will be looking for others to join the Team (especially at the January 3rd Team Meeting Night Dignity Project sorting).

The Task Force will be meeting at least two more times in January in order to finalize their Operating Guidelines and will then be ready for the first official TEAM meeting on February 7th's Team Meeting Night. The new Team will have a much more complex picture to look at—maintaining our Varsity Oxford House, maintaining the new Dignity Project, support for those groups who use our building to further the work we wish to see done in our community (Sierra Club, Rainbow Alliance, Living Wage Coalition), selecting and partnering with other agencies to receive financial and "hands on" gifts, and support for our Endowment Fund, which will eventually allow us greater fiscal power in meeting our Social Justice goals.

FACILITIES TEAM IN 2017

In January of 2017, the former Building Team and Grounds Team, along with the Aesthetics Task Force, merged to become the Facilities Team, bringing together twenty plus members ready to focus on the mission of UUTC. After adopting the Team function, members hit the ground running! During monthly meetings, members assessed, evaluated, discussed, and made recommendations that focused on the Team function.

The function of the Facilities Team is to provide a welcoming building and grounds environment where church members and visitors may experience beauty, serenity, and worship or quiet contemplation in surroundings created with respect for the integrity or our earth and its local ecosystems.
