became ill with CFS (Chronic Fatigue Syndrome). It's an educational documentary, but is also the journey of all who have this profoundly life changing illness.



UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST JUSTICE MINISTRY OF NC — COMING TO UUTC

Fed up with recent political developments? Want to see what other UUs in North Carolina are doing? Join us for Rev. John Saxon's

presentation on February 18 from 12:30-1:30PM.

The Rev. John Saxon, our guest minister on February 18, will also be giving a workshop on the activities of the "reborn" Unitarian Universalist Justice Ministry of North Carolina. The UUJM helps coordinate Moral Mondays, the Fair Court Days of Action, and "Justice on Jones Street," an advocacy day at the North Carolina General Assembly on May 22. There will be a second coffee hour after the 11:00 service, followed by John's presentation in the sanctuary from 12:30-1:30.

John says this past year has been a hard and dark one for many of us—a year of attempts to ban the immigration of Muslims, threats to deport hundreds of thousands of young "dreamers," revelations of sexual harassment and abuse, horrific mass shootings and the failure to adopt common sense gun safety laws, racists marching through the streets with torches and Confederate flags, continued partisanship, and policies that undermine health care and benefit the wealthy at the expense of the middle class, the poor, the vulnerable, and the oppressed. But it's also been a year in which people of good will have pushed back, resisting bigotry and wall-building and fear-mongering and political plundering, fighting to live as normally as we can in abnormal times, creating, loving and doing what we can to redeem the year and make a difference.

WHEN "DO AS I SAY" DOESN'T WORK

With a new UUA President and the general tumult nationally, there has never been a time more open to change as now. This year's UU General Assembly questions, "Who and how are we called to be at this time, individually and collectively?," "How are we called to act and to live?," and "How does our Unitarian Universalist legacy strengthen us in living out our mission? WHAT IS AN INSTALLATION SERVICE?

A service of installation is held to celebrate the commitment that a congregation and a minister make to one another as their formal ministry together begins. It is a special worship service held during the first year of a minister's tenure in a congregation, honoring the promises and commitments that the Minister makes to the congregation and vice versa. All Unitarian Universalist congregations, and many churches of other denominations, engage in this practice with settled Ministers. This service is traditionally held at a time other than Sunday morning so that other clergy are able to be present and

participate in the service.

Some long-time members will remember that Rev. Ernie Mills was installed at UUTC through a celebration at the library, Since UUTC's own sanctuary is too small to accommodate the number of visiting clergy, members, friends, and family members who were present for the service of installation. Rev. Ilene has partnered with her local colleague



Rev. Mary Shore to hold the service at Good Shepard Lutheran to celebrate the connection UUTC has to other faith groups in our community. Clergy from many of the local churches will attend and have special roles in the service.

There will be a guest preacher (Rev. Dr. Kate Walker from Mount Vernon Unitarian Church in Alexandria, VA), special opportunities for the choir and others to perform music, and a gathering of UU ministers from Western North Carolina and beyond. The service of installation is a valuable chance to reflect on the hopes and dreams of our shared ministry, and to celebrate a well-fitted match between UUTC and Rev. Ilene. It is a rite of passage for the congregation as well as for the Minister.

The installation of Rev. Ilene Tompkins-Gillispie as minister at UUTC will be held on April 13, 2018 at 6:00 PM at the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd. Reception will follow at UUTC.





SOCIAL ACTION AGENCY FOR FEBRUARY — BREAD OF LIFE

From its inception in 1997, Bread of Life has received broad support from Transylvania churches and individuals. Both volunteer help and financial support have been the key. Meals are served Monday through Friday and on Sunday night as well for those in need in our county. 180 free, well-balanced meals and emergency pantry boxes are provided each day. That translates to 900 meals a week, and over 45,000 each year. Bread of Life is the focus of our Social Action outreach for February at UUTC.

ANNUAL CERTIFICATION — DEFINING MEMBERSHIP

UUTC's annual certification was due to the UUA on February 1st. As in previous years, I downloaded instructions and went about collecting the data.

There were a few changes to these instructions this year. Much more complete in their descriptions, it was clear that we would not be able to just plug in Member numbers and ignore those who we designate as Friends, for instance. The UUA is encouraging member congregations to start assessing who is really committed to UUTC.

"How many Non-member Friends do you estimate are currently involved in or contribute to your congregation but are not members? *Do include*: non-members who financially contribute; parents of students enrolled in religious education; former members who have moved away but still retain a connection such as continuing to receive your newsletter...."

Well. How do we define "involved?" The financial contribution qualifier is the easy piece—our invaluable Treasurer could key up that data for me with no trouble, keying on "Friends" and an amount greater than zero for the 2017 calendar year in the contribution field. We then took our list of Committees and Teams and referenced that document against our Directory, looking for those who serve in some capacity but aren't full-blown Members. Evaluation of the created list at this point made it clear that my Committees & Teams document needed some additions—like a list of all the people serving as ushers. Like any good evaluative process, this certification thing has caused me to reassess the validity of some of our current documentation and data instruments.

Finally, there's that whole newsletter thing. Had we not moved to Constant Contact a couple years ago, this would have been an impossible question to answer. But (again referencing the Directory), now I could take the list and look for people who "haven't been seen," did not have a 2017 recorded contribution, and either had not opened their newsletters in the last 12 months or had unsubscribed themselves from the list altogether.

When all was said and done, besides our 172 Members, we needed to add 38 Friends who met the UUA criteria, as well, to the total count, bringing the number to 210 for accurate data entry. To me, this is definitely a better reflection of who is "committed" to UUTC.

This process also encouraged a re-assessment of our rolls, and you may wish to receive a new contact Directory, which is now a page shorter, thanks to feedback from a handful or so who have chosen to move to "inactive" status. Email the office if you would like the new edition.
