Is There Any Hope for Peace?

Speaker: Dick Tucker

Last month Dick participated in the sixth Global Baptist Peace Conference, which took place in Cali, Colombia. Over 350 people from 30 countries participated. While much remains to be done, Colombia has made major strides toward reconciliation. At one session a Senator representing the rebel faction FARC, and a woman whose husband was killed by the FARC, sat next to each other and shared their stories. Pockets of peace-making efforts are happening on every continent. Dick will share reflections from his experience in Cali.

The Rev. Dick Tucker, is a retired American Baptist pastor, now a member of the Alliance of Baptists. He has served as pastor of four American Baptist Churches, as a nursing home chaplain, and as a hospice chaplain. He is a member of St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Brevard where he serves as a Pastoral Associate and is active in one of the church's Centering Prayer groups. He finds fulfillment in assisting with pastoral care at St. Philips, coordinating the St. Philip's Prison Ministry Team and volunteering at The Haven overnight once a month. Dick has been an active Friend of UUTC since he and his wife, Carol Moore, moved to Brevard 8 years ago.

AUDIBLE ISSUES

Many of you have no doubt been aware that our sound system has been up to shenanigans. Sometimes we get squeals, sometimes we get microphones that don't seem to want to amplify, and sometimes, like this past Sunday, the computer just gives us a black screen with computer code on it.



So exciting!

With something as mission-critical as our sound system, "exciting" is not exactly what we hope for. "Reliable." "Easy to operate." These would be what we hope for. And lately, it has been anything but that.

The computers that are essential to the operation of this particular system are now over five years old. They have suffered through a lot of power outages. There is little doubt this has had an impact on all of the equipment, but especially on the computers themselves. Next week, to give the equipment more protection from power spikes, we will be installing a whole-panel surge protector. So the next time a car goes crashing into that power pole on Broad Street, or Duke shuts things down to install a new transformer, it will only cast us into darkness—not fry our electronics. That installation, however, will not undo the damage that has already been done.

It is time, now, to rebuild certain portions of our sound system. After considerable consideration of 3 bids, and considering what it takes to train someone for "the booth," and analysis of our current setup, it is likely that we will be replacing these computers and the component of the system that ties sound capture and amplification to those computers. That way, if a computer goes south, we can yank it out and put in a different one without needing to replace special software. We won't lose a sermon recording. We won't even lose sound amplification, because that will no longer be dependent on a computer. We would only lose the projected slides.

Since we will be making changes, we will also install what is called a "confidence monitor" — basically a big tv screen on the wall the speakers face when in the pulpit. This will help service coordinators know for sure that the slides have been advanced as they are supposed to be, and will allow people seated in the wings of the sanctuary to see lyrics for hymns more easily, as well. We will replace the bulb in our projector, which is nearing the end of its life. And we will install ceiling mounted microphones for the choir so we can eliminate cables on the floor that could be dangerous if we accidentally lit the place on fire one morning and people were in a rush to get out of the building.

No matter which bid is selected, we do not get out of this without a cost over \$17,000. Obviously, that cost is not in the operating budget, and contributions to help avoid taking out a short-term loan would be greatly appreciated. Thank you very much for your support of this mission-critical need.
