INTIMACY IN SPITE OF GROWTH

UUTC has been wildly successful, from its inception. People with good hearts and great talents have continued to build this liberal religious community in rates higher than its losses. As we continue to grow, how do we stay connected to one another? What makes us "belong" to this campus, and this group of people?



When UUTC had a smaller active group of members, things naturally felt more intimate because everybody really *could* know everybody else. That is no longer possible. What IS possible is to learn the members of a smaller group and get to know them well. This is the basis of how our new software is organized — Groups.

Even within a social networking platform like Facebook, and even within that smaller, private Group that UUTC holds on that platform, we are mostly too big to build real connections. Realm Connect brings some advantages from social networking and pairs them with the power of a database in a way that allows for groups to grow organically and organize more efficiently, while removing some barriers of office inefficiency from group communications.

In plain English, Groups don't have to ask the office to add people to their "redirect" emails in order to communicate with everyone in the Group. Groups can add whoever has expressed interest in their groups whenever they wish, without informing the office.

The above statement comes with a caveat - all members of the Group (be it Team, Committee, or other) have to set up a profile in Realm.

Realm can be accessed from a computer, tablet or smartphone. For a tablet or smartphone, you would download the Realm Connect app.

But how does this build intimacy?



In Realm, Groups are organized both by "Ministry Area" (think of

Board + Committees or Ministry Teams) and by the types of things they do — Classes, Leadership, Network and Service are the most common here at UUTC. An example of a Class is Spiritual Explorations, which gets together for educational/spiritual development purposes. An example of a Network is the Men's Group, which meets "based on affinity or activity." Both of these fall under the Leadership of yet another Group, Adult Religious Exploration.

Some people enjoy creating opportunities for others (which is what good leaders do); others really want to dig into a subject for an extended period; and still others meet for the human desire to make sense of the world with people they value and connect with. Whoever you are, you can find other people who have similar interests through Groups.

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We have begun to configure these Groups within Realm. If you were to open the app today, you would be able to get a preview of a very large (I don't think I quite had a grasp on just how much you guys do!) number of Groups at UUTC. Some are Teams. Some are Committees. And some are the results of Team activity. For each Group, two or three "leader" names have been assigned— these have been set up rather randomly, as I attempted to select people I thought actively used smartphones. Group leaders can reset all of this when they are ready.

Go to <u>onrealm.org</u> and login using the email you gave to UUTC for newsletter delivery. Click on "Forgot Password" to reset that and play around. The real adventure will begin in January. 
