PLANNING FOR MEMORIAL SERVICES — MEMBERS & FRIENDS

UUTC is formalizing processes around Memorial Services that better suit our size and volunteer infrastructure. A new brochure, available at the front counter, walks you through part of the process. Rev. Ilene has also mentioned that “planning your own memorial service” is likely to be an offering at the UUTC Fall Retreat at The Mountain Retreat & Learning Center. Planning ahead ensures that you have a service that reflects your own desires and reduces stress on your survivors, because they don’t have to guess what you might have wanted done.



Standard procedure for memorial services now includes a fee that allows us to have Hector and Teresa set up tables and chairs ahead of time and to take all of that down and clean up afterwards. Our care team, Loving Hearts and Helping Hands, is comprised of fewer than 10 people who are working to meet the needs of 190 Members and 60 Friends — the work of memorial services, in terms of setup and cleanup, doesn’t require their unique skills and heart. We encourage the use of caterers, since our kitchen is not licensed for commercial use.* Families, of course, can choose to prepare receptions on their own—but the setup and cleanup will be done by our paid facilities contractors.

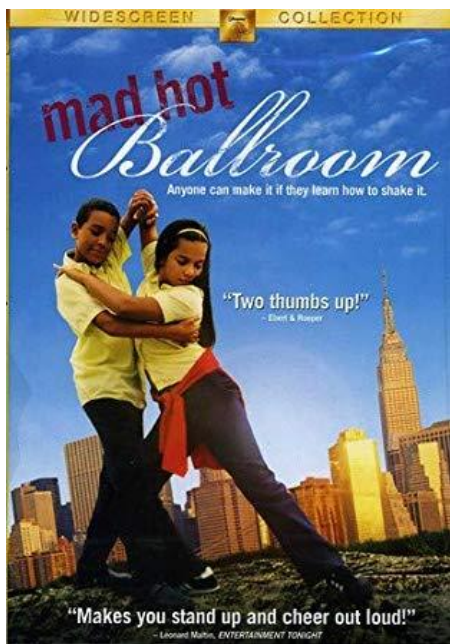
Currently, UUTC has no paid music staff. While John Austin and Carlene Ragan have been generous contributors of their skills, we cannot count on their continued availability at all and any times. Consequently, the fee for memorial services also includes a small stipend which Carlene or John (or both) could choose to accept as compensation, or it can be used to hire an outside musician as necessary. Should John or Carlene refuse compensation, the money goes to the music program for its needs. These two elements, music and facilities contracts, make up the \$400 fee paid by Members and Friends for memorial services.



The brochure includes the names of recommended funeral homes, florists and caterers — these are all people known to LHHH and UUTC as being thoughtful, skilled providers of these services.

UUTC FALL RETREAT @ THE MOUNTAIN: REGISTRATION IS OPEN!

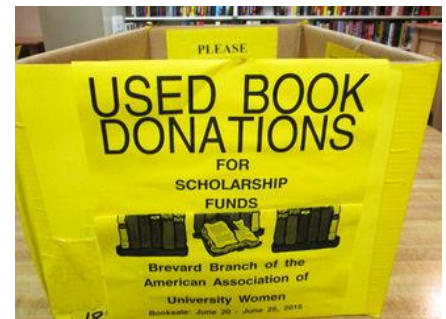
Its been a long time since UUTC has had a retreat at The Mountain (over 4 years) and finally we have an opportunity to do it again!

The mechanism for supporting these outside-the-budget items has been accumulation of donations in the **Sponsored Project Fund**. This is a capital fund, not an operating fund. Pledges are never allocated to the Sponsored Project Fund. No new donations to this fund have come in this fiscal year—though plenty of other outside-the-budget donations have been made to the Endowment fund, where we have made fantastic progress. The Board authorizes projects when funds are available.

We have a new level of urgency, however, for some items in this list (in bold). The first supports the need for additional fellowship & classroom space—picnic tables. The cost listed above is for four assembled and delivered picnic tables. These tables will provide outdoor seating for Sandwich Sundays and a place for Danny to meet with our kiddos during CRE time—whether it is on Sundays or during the summer. The second is a TV with all the necessary “fixins” to use for memorial service overflow, Adult Religious and Children’s Religious Exploration needs. This includes wiring for the setup, a wall mount, the actual TV, cabling for ethernet and HDMI from our sanctuary video camera and other accessories to meet needs of ARE/CRE — a DVD player and AppleTV.

The third is the janitorial mop sink. Currently (and this is one reason we aren’t licensed as a commercial kitchen), mopping the floor means either emptying a mop bucket into the kitchen sink (ponder that a moment) or pouring soiled water which contains cleaning fluids into our parking lot storm drains which drain into Jumping Branch. There’s a reason this building feature is part of standard commercial kitchen code—to protect human health and our water supply.

Already on your radar should be our sound system, which needs at least some tweaking. Of the four companies contacted two weeks ago to diagnose and remedy, one emailed and called and is likely to be here on Monday to do an assessment. When that assessment has a number attached to it, the Board will be notified.

The final project to call your attention to is thermal privacy blinds for the social hall. Roberta Carver, of the Aesthetics Team (sub-team of Facilities) got new bids for this project which reflect a higher R value (4.5) and a lower price. With the social hall being pressed into greater service, the ability to control heat and light in that space would be a benefit to many... including all whose pledges pay our power bills!

PLANNING FOR IMPERMANENCE

The Facilities Team, charged with strategic planning in meeting some immediate and long-term needs, has been working with a footprint of the property to conceptualize solutions.



The first need was to address a “church use” for the footprint of the former house on the property. Having a defined congregational use means that we will not pay property taxes on the land. This identified need was defined as a Fellowship Space—hence, picnic tables we already own were moved to that part of our property, with the intention that more will be added so that the Welcoming Team doesn’t have to drag our folding tables out for Sandwich Sundays, and the Facilities Team will not have to wash the legs of the tables and chairs every good-weather month.



In this drawing, you can see their proposed plan for the space. Tables are to be surrounded by wildflower meadow, with some stones for structure, and some type of shade (probably shade cloths) set up to create a joyful, playful space.



The second need addressed in their plan is to provide better privacy for the women of the Oxford House. You may have seen them hanging privacy blinds from the porch— they would love to be more protected from the eye-level glare of headlights. The new plan includes moving existing stone edge pieces to create a raised bed at the front of the house, with attractive native plantings to provide better screening. These transported stones will come from beds alongside the house—removal of these stones and re-purposing them will also simplify grounds maintenance for Hector.



The final piece they hope to address before summer is the construction of raised beds for CRE use in the summer. Future plans include natural play structures for our children to be located behind the Chalice (yellow) house.

The Facilities Team’s plan is designed to meet current needs in an impermanent (no poured concrete, etc.) manner so that the spaces created can be sacrificed without demolition costs. While creation of these spaces will move forward at a pace permitted by funds and energy, their vision is exciting!
