OUR WHOLE LIVES RETURNS



The CRE program will again offer the Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education for 7th, 8th and 9th graders. This is a sexuality education program for youth that models and teaches caring, compassion, respect, and justice. Our Whole Lives provides accurate, developmentally appropriate information about a range of topics, including relationships, gender identity, sexual orientation, sexual health, and cultural influences on sexuality. **The facilitators are Heather Layton and Kevin Lausch.**

The program will launch in late January and runs for 10 weekly sessions on Sunday afternoons, including two retreats. All 7th-9th youth are invited to attend (whether UU or not), and a parent information session is included. CRE CLASSES REBOOT

CRE began the year with Danny Szemple and an inter-generational model of children in the service. He had a successful Chalice Camp for approximately 15 children. After his resignation, Kevin Lausch transitioned into the DCRE position and re-launched CRE classroom programming in September. Due to parental preference, the CRE classes moved to the 9:15 service. Two UUTC teens were hired as teaching assistants and 3 adults were hired as part-time teachers. Sadly, one of the teachers moved out of state in December. The largest obstacle faced by the program is the need for a temporary or full-time teacher for the younger class and more parent volunteers to assist CRE programming. Our younger children's class (ages 4-7) has between 8-12 children.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

A Family Fun Night launched in October and will be held occasionally. Time for All Ages now happens in both services once a month. A CRE food drive for Sharing House collected over 200lbs. of food. And Santa's Workshop hosted 22 happy kids for holiday gift making, thanks to 10 incredible volunteers. Finally, Kevin is hoping to send children to the Mountain for Youth Con in the spring. WORK OF THE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE IN 2019

During 2019 year, the Administration Committee reviewed, revised and submitted to the Board its Operating Guidelines for approval, as directed by policy and the UUTC Organizational Structure.

Members conducted an annual review of the Policy Manual and recommended to the Board a 2019 Edition of the Policy Manual, which was adopted. Over the course of the year, the committee responded to requests from the Board to recommend new policies on Gift Planning (Section V. FINANCE), Stewardship of UUTC Property (Section VI. PROPERTY), Disruptive Behavior (Section III. PEOPLE), and clarification of benefits for part-time employees (Section VII. EMPLOYMENT). These new policies were approved and are included in the current Policy Manual.

Finally, at the request of the Board, the committee undertook a complete review of the UUTC Bylaws. Committee members concluded the year with a December report to the Board recommending proposed revisions to the Bylaws for their consideration. Approvement of these revisions by the Board will create the **need for voting on these revisions at the Congregational Meeting on May 17th.**

SOCIAL ACTION TEAM YEAR IN REVIEW

FUNCTION: The function of the Social Action Team is to provide leadership within the congregation for spiritually nourishing and impactful engagement in social, economic, and environmental justice endeavors that are aligned with UUTC goals and UU values.

The Social Action Team has had a busy year reorganizing, revitalizing, and refocusing its activities in addition to continuing some of its traditional areas of focus.

There were two major changes for the Social Action Team early in the year, one involving our team leadership, with Susan Zelle stepping down as Team Leader to join the UUTC Board of Directors and Lisa McHenry and Sharon Moya agreeing to take on the role as co-leaders for a year. Having said that, it's also important to note that the Team now operates using shared leadership so that, fundamentally, all Team members perform leadership roles. In addition to now having an official Team secretary, others on the Team organize and lead many of the activities and programs that are a part of what we do. We are happy to report that we've had five new individuals join the Team this year.

The second major change that occurred early this year is that Sacred Fire combined with the Social Action Team with all combined membership agreeing to follow the Sacred Fire model of social action. This model focuses on whole congregation involvement in social action that seeks to (1) impact at a systemic level, (2) grow relationships with others and other organizations, (3) seek root causes of injustices, and (4) focus on changes to systems rather than simply giving (although we still do a fair amount of that while trying to bring about change within the system).

To help accomplish what the model seeks, the Team held two retreats in which it took a hard look at what we do as a Team and what we believe we should be doing. Sometimes those matched, and sometimes they didn't. We then set goals for July, 2019-June, 2020 and reorganized how the Team operates. The Team now conducts as much of its "business" as possible through email and rotates Team meeting nights

with programs and field trips. The programs further our knowledge in the areas of the chosen goals, and the field trips seek to build relationships with our partner organizations and their clientele. For programs this year, we have heard from Emily Lowery (Director of the Haven), Beth Brannigan (social worker for Transylvania County Schools), Mark Burrows (related to housing issues), Eric Edwards (former homeless person who is now a leader in the County), and Jim Hardy (informing us about the Prisoner Re-entry Initiative). For field trips, we visited SAFE, had a barbecue with the Haven residents, and went bowling with residents of the Haven. Several members of the Social Action Team have also signed on as volunteers at the Haven, and the Team works together at the Bread of Life on 5th Thursdays.



Other highlights of the year include most members of the Team attending

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an all-day social justice training in Hendersonville (along with several other members of the UUTC congregation), adding three new organizations to the Dignity Project, a second successful year of Operation Keep Warm, a joint sponsoring of Power Up with St. Philips and the Jewish community, adoption of Davidson River School and the Haven for the Christmas Giving Tree, helping to furnish homes of Haven residents who receive housing, organization of charitable giving, and delivery of food to the Haven four times. At-will members have also helped to organize and/or implement some of our favorite social action activities: Lenten Service, Pack the Pantry, Sharing House 5th Sundays, Crop Walk, Undie Sunday, Christmas centerpieces, Back-to-School supplies, AAUW book collection, and the St. Mary's Christmas dinner.

We begin the new year with a retreat in January to re-evaluate our goals and redirect our actions and a program in February, where we will learn about an environmental justice initiative happening in Asheville and Hendersonville. The rest of the year's activities will depend on what we decide at our January retreat.

UUTC is all about social, economic, and environmental justice, and the Social Action Team is but a small group that strives to bring willing people together with people in need to help alleviate the injustices that are so prevalent in our society. We organize, and you respond...unfailingly...enthusiastically... generously. Without you, there would be no Social Action Team. Thank you for all you do!



2019-2020 WORSHIP TEAM: CHALLENGES & CREATIVITY

FUNCTION: Assist the Minister in providing spiritually nourishing worship services that are consistent with the values of our congregation.

When Rev. Ilene developed heath problems and was forced to resign from UUTC, the Worship Team leapt into action and continued to

provide outstanding programming on Sundays thanks to a very talented team. Joanna Bliss's efficient and decisive leadership, paired with the experience of John Austin (a choir director for DECADES), kept UUTC warm and connected during a critical time in the life of the Congregation.

New talent joined the Team, providing for strong leadership in the role of service coordination. Working with Rev. Shore, the Team has helped craft more inclusive services that empower more of membership to share their talents during Sunday services. Rev. Shore also led us through a transition to a new model of Joys & Sorrows that has increased participation while reducing the disruption of "flow" in the service. Finally, the choir continues to add new members and opportunities for musical ensembles which enrich Sunday Services. We continue to work towards "support for individual spiritual journeys."
