Excerpts from the Minutes:

Present: Glenn Cockerham, Betty Kendrick, Gail Meyers, Bart Renner, Kay Webb, Alice Wellborn, Rev. Bob, RK Young and Joanna Bliss.

Minister's Report – Rev. Bob shared that in November, certain elements will return to



Sunday service, such as in-person choir and passing the baskets. During October, he led the Soul Matters discussion on "Cultivating Relationship" with a very small group and led a hybrid Climate Series presentation on "Religious Grounding in Environmentalism", with Rev. Fred Small, one of the top 15 religious leaders in environmentalism. (And much more... Ed.)

Treasurer's Report – Gail reported that the Private Letter Ruling had been filed with the IRS and that she received a call from the individual assigned to the case. While the associated Drive Down the Debt Campaign doesn't officially launch until November, early bird contributions of \$13,000 have already saved \$10,700 in interest. At this point in the loan, each contribution saves us 180% (100% principal and 80% interest), so she expressed hope that we will get a good response to the campaign. She also reported that the first payroll with our new payroll service was successful.

Operations Report — RK reported that the Glen Cannon Property Association's program (live and via Zoom) held in the sanctuary on October 27th was successful, with the exceptional help of UUTC's A/V Team. With the positive feedback received, she feels confident in rolling out a more carefully targeted space rental campaign, highlighting primarily the technology and staff we have in place to facilitate meetings safely. Paired with more reasonable rental fees, she believes UUTC has something others can't offer, which may be a help in funding our mission.

Old Business: Ministry/Minister Review Task Force completed its review in October. President Bart Renner will prepare an article on this process for a future newsletter.

New Business: Endowment Committee Report – Joanna Bliss, Chair of the Endowment Committee, shared the names of the recipients selected to received awards from UUTC's Community Outreach Endowment Fund for 2021-2022. Three grants, totaling \$10,200, were awarded. At 4.6% of the Endowment Fund balance as of June 30, 2021, this falls within the 3-5% guidelines and satisfies the requirement to not reduce the Endowment Fund balance below 90% of the nominal value of the fund as of June 30, 2021. Grant recipients had not been notified at the time of the Board meeting.

Drive Down the Debt: Giving Tuesday Starts Now

When we purchased the parcels on Varsity Street, they came with rental houses. These houses, per IRS code (Neighborhood Use Act) must be destroyed/removed by 2032. That may seem ridiculous, and it may seem like a long way away, but we will need to start sooner than that to accomplish the goal... along with all the loose ends. It is the law, designed to force non-profits to **not** use debt-financed property for non-missional uses.

Removing these two structures, however, reduces the value of our property and could put our mortgage at risk. So this fall, help us give UUTC the gift of debt reduction. All funds collected will become a payment of extra principal on our current mortgage. Our payments will go on as usual, but we will greatly increase the chances of a successful re-evaluation of the property as related to the unmet balance of our loan. Paying \$35,000 in an extra principal payment will save over \$23,600 in interest. \$50,000, however, is our goal for this campaign. Nothing is being built with these donations—this is just a necessary step to put us in the fiscal position of being able to meet the demands of the Neighborhood Use Act.

Some points to remember:

- When this property (land and 3 houses) became available in 2016, we saw it as an opportunity for our future.
- ◆ The congregational vote to purchase the property was unanimously approved. That rarely happens in a congregation of our size.
- We have benefitted financially by renting the houses, which has helped pay the mortgage.
- Removing one of the houses, which was in very poor shape, enabled us to have more space for outside activities. (Hello, Fellowship Green and Fire Ring!)
- ◆ If we do not remove/destroy the houses by 2032, then we can be assessed for all rental income from 2022 forward.

Challenge Donations from your Board and others: \$26,300. \$23,000 of this is already in the bank. \$17,000 has already been paid directly to Principal, saving us approximately *\$13,700* in interest.

SURE that you replace "Pledge" (the default fund) with "Drive Down the Debt." You will have to scroll down to find it. Your administrator's preferred method would be checks, as there are no fees for us to pay on those. But do what works best for you. Any size contribution will be appreciated!

This campaign ends on November 30th. Black Friday, Cyber Monday... and Giving Tuesday. Let's get ourselves prepared for the challenges of the next ten years.

Big Hairy Deal

Last Saturday, as a crew of us was working the tent at HalloweenFest, Eloise Shepard came up to us with an envelope in hand. She had been to the post office and figured this one might be important. She hadn't opened it. I took a look at the address (IRS was in there) and started ripping the envelope open. I had not completely removed the letter inside before I grinned and handed it back to Eloise with directions



to give it to Gail Meyers, who was also working the booth as Little Red Riding Hood (pictured above). It was the determination letter from the IRS that said, **yes**, you get your own, official, **501(c)3 designation**.

This was an important step for us on its own merits, because it allows us to be monitored by GuideStar and other measurements of charitable integrity, and also allows for integrating donations into our social media platforms. This is especially important as we have built our online programming options, which are of value to an increasing audience— many of whom live nowhere near us. This gives them a simple way to acknowledge that value with a tax-deductible donation.

More critically at this time, however, was the need to complete this process to better secure the private letter ruling we've asked for as concerns the Varsity properties. The agent assigned to make the determination was already asking us had we applied, when did we apply — getting this letter in hand simplifies that process and makes it clear we are working to meet the letter of the law.

Operations Update

October was a heck of a busy month. Many projects reached fruition, and more are coming up or in process. The Aventon Pace 350 is still on campus but due to be picked up very soon. The local winner, Harry Parrish, Jr., may show up for the BYOB at the RING so that we can all express our jealousy!

Payroll has now been outsourced to Gusto, a smaller payroll services company. With most employees working at least part-time off campus, we needed a timekeeping app that they could use to track their time no matter where they are working. (And *I* needed it to be the SAME app, no matter what device

they are using.) In addition, the legal and tax work involved in employees—from hiring to the production of W2s and payroll taxes— was not getting any easier, and Sue Gervais, in Florida, was getting more busy in her other job—making her less able to do this work on weekdays. We have now had two payroll cycles for salaried staff, and one for hourly staff, and I think we're good to go. Our first new employee, associated with Children's Religious Exploration, is currently in the onboarding process. Employees can review any paystub from within the app, track their time, request time off, review files required by our personnel polices and more. This allows the Personnel Committee to not be involved in daily operations and allows me to juggle less paper, as most of this is stored in the cloud.



Our offices are a mess right now. Responding to operational needs has left us little time to try to disassemble old structures and reconfigure new ones. (If you've got time to help with some disassembly/ reassembly, come see me Tuesday!) This week, with the big copier's lease up, we let that one go and installed a new, smaller profile version. While we lose the ability to create 11x17 copies, we have a smaller footprint (something we desperately need, right now), and it reduces our monthly cost by about \$35. In addition, since we have done away with a weekly order of service, we can reduce our printing output and save a few more trees.

Office Hours: Eloise has received a promotion at the County Library (no surprise, there!) and so can only be in the office on Mondays. She starts at 10:00am and works through until around 4, usually. I am in the office on Tuesdays starting at 10—I will be getting out of the way of the Meditation Group that meets from 4 to 5 (unless I can't resist joining them!). Amy is available on Thursdays from 10-noon. Any of these days is a great time to come in and check out a puzzle or book from the UUTC library and get reacquainted with our space! Due to the time his cardiac rehab takes, it's best to make an appointment with Rev. Bob via email if you'd like to schedule time with him.

HalloweenFest was our first foray into modern Membership work. Meeting our mission requires us to let those who share our values find us. People need to meet people to know if they "click." A website can't really do that. Videos of services help some, but they really only tell folks about our minister, not about how they would feel in the space. Younger people who are also passionate about social justice, the environment, and seek a space to nurture their spiritual development are out there. How much more effective would we be in our work if the energy of youth became a more integrated part of our ministry? We plan to repeat this event annually, including the bike raffle, which allows us to share our values.

Kathryn & Doug continue to do conscientious, compassionate work. I could not be more proud of how they are handling every new challenge that gets thrown their way. Recently, Kathryn spent a pile of hours patching together a wedding video for Linda & Richard Packer, since microphone problems had made some portions of the "straight shoot" not easy to hear. Jean Rowe re-read portions to fix that, and Kathryn spliced in pieces of video of John Austin playing. This is the kind community that we aim to be— one that cares for each of you, as best we can.




Grateful
