Present: Ian Cowie, Vicki Held, Victoria Kerr, Gail Meyers, Quim Moya, Kay Webb, Alice Wellborn, Rev. Bob Renjilian (via zoom) and RK Young.



Minister's Report – Due to illness, Rev. Bob's attended the meeting from home via Zoom. He updated Board members on the status of the Membership Team and the challenge of finding volunteers to staff the Team.

Treasurer's Report – The May Treasurer's Report was shared with the Board prior to the meeting. In Mike's absence, consultant Gail Meyers shared her Consultant Comments, Consultant's Report, and Projections Estimates for the end of FY 22-23. The financial outlook for the end of the year continues to be a concern, with the likelihood that there will be a deficit. Gail recommended that the Board move \$10,000 from the Reserve Fund into the Operating Fund to handle upcoming bills. The Board so moved.

Operations Report — RK provided an update on the progress of the new bookkeeper, Chelsea Caldwell, who is working in cooperation with off-site bookkeeper, Sue Gervais, and consultant, Gail Meyers. Chelsea is very thankful to have Gail's expertise a phone call away. RK reported on FY 22-23 pledge fulfillment and other budget observations related to the current financial concerns. Over \$15,000 is still due on pledges for this fiscal year. While keeping our operating expenses below budget, our revenues are less than what was budgeted for the year, so she encourages attendance at the June concerts to increase revenues.

Old Business: Annual Meeting Update— A copy of the DRAFT May 21, 2023, Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes was shared with Board members prior to the meeting. Kay reported that the quorum of 43 Members was exceeded; the 2022 Annual Meeting Minutes were approved; the slate of nominees for elected positions was approved by acclamation; the 23-24 Budget was approved unanimously; the Board Secretary position for 23-24 is vacant, so the new Board will need to appoint a Member to the position in July.

Old Business: Compensation Update—Issues remain with Rev. Bob's compensation. Additional income, represented in the budget as SECA, was not included in retirement contributions calculations beginning with his hiring. In coming weeks, we will work with UUA to get accurate calculations to reimburse these deficits.

New Business: Board Appreciation Party – Gail Meyers offered to host a potluck appreciation garden party at her home for the outgoing Board members and the newly elected Board, date and time TBD.

Board Retreat — The Board President and Rev. Bob will collaborate to schedule and plan a retreat for the new Board, time and place TBD.


Let's work together to create a handful of ideas for each of these categories that are exciting and aspirational; a stretch to inspire people to act, but achievable.

In Praise of Worker Bees

UUTC has seen a lot of hustle and bustle over the last year, as we rebuild what "normal" looks like. Staff has worked hard... but they have been supported by a lot of different folks standing up to build this community into that which they seek. And it is a delight to watch.

I don't get to take time to take "all the pictures" of everything awesome that you

folks do. But I do see you... leading classes, rehearsing on piano, cooking and baking, tending the grounds, working in the AV booth, cleaning carpets, touching up paint, watching for the welfare of others with cards, calls and texts, attempting to clean wax stains from drippy Christmas Eve candles off the chairs in the sanctuary. It



takes more than a village — it takes a village with tools, workers, and resources to realize its dreams.

I was delighted at Pi Day this year, with the variety of things baked... and the vigor of the bidding. And stumbling upon Ian & Vanessa Cowie cleaning up wax prior to this Sunday's big event did my heart a bunch of good. But it's been the continued labor of Facilities and the Grow Getters that I'd like to hold up at this moment.

This has been every week labor. Watering. Planting. Weeding. Moving the dirt first to one place and then another. Mixing bone dry peat moss with granite fines to create something akin to a "natural" bog from these mountains. More weeding. More planting. And there's still more to do.

Last year, the Grow Getters wreaked havoc on a number of invasive species that were, by definition, "in cultivation" on our campus. This is something that would prohibit the acquisition of their 7th

Principle goal: attaining official native habitat status. The "hellstrip" on the Broad Street side of the campus had volumes of liriope that they removed. Then they planted, using funds raised by the first Pi Day auction and a Faithify campaign. Everything, shockingly, has survived. Native plants for the win!

Only now are they getting the plant labels placed for *that* project, at the same time as they are installing signage for the *new* project, which probably ought to have a name other

than "the bog project." They have artfully arranged (and some not so artfully) stone around the bog, to create the "storm drain" from the bog to run off on the Varsity side of the sign. They have spent some of their own money on some of this, in addition to what they have raised.

They are still not finished — some plants specified in the design have been more difficult to acquire this year, with some nursery stock damaged by the 5 degree December event after so much warmer weather. But we will soon celebrate their accomplishments, and will continue in the fall when new plantings can be more successful. Come to the party — summer solstice is just around the corner—and why should you not take delight in what they have done? Come and celebrate with them.
